Air Conditioners

- 1. Adelaide, Barossa Valley and Mount Gambier. 4 nights in Adelaide and 1 in Mt Gambier. Guided tour of city, Torrens River cruise, Rundle Mall and Glenelg shops and beach. Barossa Valley wineries, Angas Park dried Fruit Centre, Whispering Wall and Birdwood Mill Motor Museum in Barossa. Hahndorf historic German village and Port Adelaide Cruise. Kingston and Mt Gambier Blue Lake and Cave Gardens. Cost \$1200-1300.
- **2. Canberra and Cowra**. 4 nights in Canberra and 1 in Cowra. SCIENCE MATTERS - GRAVITATIONAL WAVES

Gravitational waves - Einstein's spacetime ripples, reveal the secrets of the universe. What are Gravitational Waves and why was their first detection in 2016 so important for the future of astronomy? The existence of these waves were predicted by Einstein in 1916, but it was 100 years before technology advanced enough to be able to measure them. Their detection was hugely significant for the study of the universe for now there was another way to look at objects out in space that did not show any light, like black holes. It was like adding ears to listen for traffic on the road when previously we were limited to looking with our eyes. The 2017 Nobel prize was awarded to those involved.

We will use the book written by popular science writer, Brian Clegg, to explain in words of two syllables, what they are and why they are so important.


WALK AND TALK
