

Named after the mythological dog that guarded the underworld, HMVS Cerberus served as both a coastal defence ship and a symbol of maritime innovation.

In the late 1860's Victoria was awash with gold. Things were a bit dodgy around the world and Victoria [the state and not the head of the empire] decided we needed a gunboat.

The talk will include all aspects of STEM, the mathematical part being how many heads did Cerberus have, and the technology being how did Artificial Intelligence produce the initial paragraph in a fraction of a second?

SOCRATES CAFÉ

On Monday November 25th at 10.00 am at Socrates Cafe we will discuss **What would happen if a maximum income was implemented?**

A maximum income has been considered before. In Sweden in 1976, there was 102% tax rate imposed on the highest bracket tax and in the USA, President Franklin Roosevelt suggested a maximum wage of \$25,000 during WWII (about \$400,000 today), which led to the imposition of a marginal tax rate of 93% on upper incomes.

Some of the questions likely to be discussed are: Does having a maximum wage produce a shortage of certain types of workers? Who decides on what proportion of our country's income does each of us get? Would we lose our incentive to work hard? Would a maximum wage send a message that there's more to life than chasing after ever greater amounts of money? Does large inequality between wages lead to an inefficient allocation of talent and opportunity, stifling creativeness? I hope to see you there.
