Some species were White-necked and White-faced herons, Nankeen Night-heron, Great Egret, Eurasian Coot, Australasian Grebe, Black Swan, Little Pied and Little Black Cormorants, Grey Teal, Pacific Black Duck, Sacred Kingfisher, Eastern and Yellow Rosellas and Mistletoe bird.

NATURAL RESOURCES & REGIONAL DEVELOPMENT

One session only this month because April 7 is Good Friday.

On April 14 at 10am Pam Beattie, Project Co-ordinator River Health & Environmental Water, will present a session focusing on the Broken River and Broken Creek systems. These drainage systems, frequently not at the forefront of local consciousness, cover a diverse set of ecosystems. The catchment includes districts around Mansfield to east of Benalla, then north to the west of Warby Ranges and thereafter to the flat irrigation country east of Katamatite. Additionally, the natural connection between the Broken River and Creek systems, which starts around Casey's Weir and goes north to Tungamah, has been modified. Irrigation systems are also interconnected. The East Goulburn Main Channel runs into the Broken Creek and Murray system water enters the Broken Creek at several spots between Katamatite and immediately south of the Barmah Choke.

Pam's presentation will describe what lives in these diverse ecosystems, how they are being managed and the difficulties in achieving the GBCMA goals for these streams."
